Math 12 Test 3 Summer 2011

1. Solve
$$\frac{dy}{dx} = xy - x$$
 for y, supposing that $y = 4$ when $x = 0$.

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = x(y-1)$$
Fill in $x=0, y=4$:

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = x dx$$
Fill in $x=0, y=4$:

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = 0 + c = c$$
So now $\ln|y-1| = \frac{1}{2}x^2 + \ln 3$
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$$\frac{dy}{dx} = y - 1$$

$$\frac{dy}{dx} = \int x dx$$

$$\frac{dy}{y-1} = \int x dx$$

$$\frac{dy}{y-1} = \int x dx$$

- 2. Suppose your first full-time job out of college has a starting salary of \$53,000 per year. After two years your salary is \$58,000 per year. If your salary grows at an exponential rate, and how much can you expect to be making 15 years after graduation?
 - () t=0 B=53000() t=2 B=58000() t=15 B=? $B=Pe^{rt}$

$$D = 53000 = Pe^{-t} = P$$

 $B = 53000 e^{rt}$

(2)
$$58000 = 53000 e^{r(2)}$$

 $58 = e^{2r}$
 $4n \frac{58}{53} = 2r$
 $r = \frac{1}{2} 4n \frac{58}{53} \approx 0.84508$
(3) $B = 53000 e^{-0.04508(15)}$
 $B \approx (104, 211. 78)$

3. Calculate the following integrals:

a)
$$\int \frac{8x^3 - 6x^2 - x^4}{3x^3} dx = \int \left(\frac{8}{3} - 2x^{-1} - \frac{1}{3}x\right) dx$$
$$= \frac{8}{3}x - 2\ln|x| - \frac{1}{6}x^2 + C$$

b)
$$\int \frac{(x^2+4)^2}{x^2} dx = \int \frac{x^4 + 8x^2 + 16}{x^2} dx = \int (x^2 + 8 + 16x^{-2}) dx$$
$$= \frac{1}{3} x^3 + 8x - \frac{16}{5} x^{-1} + C$$

c)
$$\int \frac{(\ln x)^3}{3x} dx = \frac{1}{3} \int u^3 du = \frac{1}{12} u^4 + C$$
$$= \frac{1}{12} (\ln x)^4 + C$$
$$du = \frac{1}{x} dx$$

4. Find f'(x) for the following functions. DO NOT simplify!

(a)
$$f(x) = (\ln(x^3 - 1))^2$$

 $f'(x) = 2(\ln(x^3 - 1))(\frac{1}{x^3 - 1})(3x^2)$

(b)
$$f(x) = \frac{\ln x}{e^{x} + 1}$$

 $f'(x) = \frac{(\frac{1}{x})(e^{x} + 1) - (f(nx))(e^{x})}{(e^{x} + 1)^{2}}$

5. George borrows \$1000 from a loan shark. The loan shark compounds the interest on the loan quarterly. At the end of one year, George owes \$16,000. What annual interest rate was charged by the loan shark?

P=1000	$B = P(1+\frac{r}{k})^{kt}$	r=4
B = 16000 t = 1	$16000 = 1000 (1 + \frac{r}{4})^4$	Interest
K = 4	$16 = \left(1 + \frac{r}{4}\right)^4$	rate 13 400%
	$4\sqrt{16} = 1 + \frac{1}{4}$	
	2=1+7	
	$1 = \frac{1}{4}$	

6. Suppose $f(x) = 3 - 5e^{-x}$. Find the intervals where the curve is increasing and where it is decreasing, where it is concave up and where it is concave down, all maxima, minima, inflection points, and asymptotes. If there are none, say so. Then draw a sketch of the graph.

7. a) Showing all your steps and without using a calculator, simplify $e^{3\ln 4 - \ln 2}$ as much as possible.

$$e^{3ln4-ln2} = e^{ln4^3-ln2}$$

= $e^{ln(\frac{4^3}{2})}$
= $\frac{4^3}{2}$
= $\frac{4^3}{2}$
= $\frac{4^4}{2} = 32$

b) Solve $5 = 1 + 4e^{-6x}$ for *x*.

$$4 = 4 e^{-6x}$$

 $1 = e^{-6x}$
 $ln = 0 = -6x$
 $0 = x$

8. Evaluate $\int \sqrt{x} \ln x \, dx$.

$$\begin{aligned} u &= \ln x & dv = x^{1/2} dx \\ du &= x dx & v = \frac{2}{3} x^{3/2} \\ uv - Sv du &= \frac{2}{3} x^{3/2} \ln x - \frac{2}{3} \int x^{3/2} (\frac{1}{x}) dx \\ &= \frac{2}{3} x^{3/2} \ln x - \frac{2}{3} \int x^{1/2} dx \\ &= \frac{2}{3} x^{3/2} \ln x - \frac{4}{9} x^{3/2} + C \end{aligned}$$
