

b)(5) Calculate the diameter of the wire's circular cross section.





7. (40) A capacitor of capacitance  $C=4 \mu F$  has been charged so that the potential difference between its plates is 100 V. The capacitor is then connected to a 5k  $\Omega$  resistor as shown. The switch S is closed and the capacitor begins to discharge.



a)(5) Calculate the time constant of the circuit.

b) (5) Determine the charge on the capacitor when the switch is closed at t=0.
